## 2. DIMAPUR GOVERNMENT COLLEGE: A PROFILE

D imapur Government College, previously known as Dimapur College, was established in the year 1966. It was taken over by the Government of Nagaland in 1989. In the initial years, the college was affiliated to Guwahati University, Guwahati, then to North Eastern Hill University, Shillong and since 1995 with Nagaland University, Lumami. It is recognised under section 2 (f) and 12 (b) of the UGC Act. The college is governed by the Advisory Board headed by Deputy Commissioner as Chairman. The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell, with the Principal as Chairman with the mandate of policy making for the development of the college. The college has been accredited with B+ grade in the year 2022 by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Benguluru.

The college offers undergraduate programmes in Arts & Commerce Streams under the newly introduced four years undergraduate programme (FYUP) and Post Graduate programme in arts. The college offers major programmes in nine subjects namely (i) Economics, (ii)Education, (iii) English, (iv) History, (v) Political Science, (vi) Philosophy, (vii) Sociology, (viii) Psychology and (ix) Commerce. The college offers M.A. programme in Education. There are a total of 68 faculty members involved with the teaching learning and mentoring process. Teachers are involved in the decision making process through various committees and they contribute in guiding the students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. There are 60 non-teaching staff to provide support to the office, teachers as well as students.

The college has a sprawling green campus of around 30 acres, spread out in two campuses adjacent to each other. The old campus houses the Arts Block, Seminar Hall, IGNOU Regional Centre, and a Canteen. The new campus houses the Administrative Block, The Central Library, Commerce Block, Auditorium cum Indoor Game Facility, Boys and Girls hostels and Science Block, to start soon. The new campus also houses sports facilities, which include a football ground, one basketball and two volleyball courts. The college has two power generator sets each of 35 KVA and 20 KVA along with a solar power UPSs of 20 KVA and 3KVA each. The college is working on rainwater harvesting projects under the Jal Shakti Mission

Various co-curricular activities are organised for the benefit of the students throughout the year. The college has a Skill Hub under the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) There are four approved job roles, namely (i)Sewing Machine

Operator, (ii) Beautician (iii) Technician (Home Appliances) and (iv) Technician (Computer Hardware). After successful completion of the training, trainees receive а globally recognised certificate by NSDC. A vocational programme in Floriculture is also being offered under the initiative of the DGC RUSA. Two units of NCC (boys & girls) under the Coy Corps and three units of NSS under the Ministry of Youth Affairs, Govt. of India are actively involved in nation-building as well as self-enrichment activities. Through these activities, students acquire recognised certificates, which are helpful for their career progression. The Evangelical Union is another group that is involved in moral rearmament and spiritual growth of the students. Besides, there are many extra-curricular activities in Sports, Literature, Performing & Fine Arts that are being carried out for the benefit of the students. Each academic department has a Students Club with teacher advisors. These clubs provide a platform to bring out the creative best from an individual student student-centric activities. The DGC Alumni Association is one of the strong through pillars of college development. It plays a supportive role in policy making and in enriching the academic environment of the college.

The college fraternity strives hard for academic excellence to meet the aspirations of the people of Nagaland. The college looks forward for support from all stake holders to achieve the shared vision.

# 3. COURSES OFFERED

#### (A) FOUR YEARS UDERGRADUATE PROGRAM (FYUP)

(I) MAJOR: (i) Economics (ii) Education (iii) English (iv) History (v) Philosophy (vi) Political Science (vii) Sociology (viii) Psychology and (ix) Commerce

(II) MINOR: (i) Economics (ii) Education (iii) English (iv) History
(v) Philosophy (vi) Political Science (vii) Psychology (viii) Sociology
(ix) Tenyidie (x) Commerce (xi) Hindi

The guidelines incorporate the principles of the newly introduced National Education Policy (NEP)–2020 which lays emphasis on imparting holistic and multidisciplinary education to learners. NEP–2020 states that such "education would be aimed at developing all capacities of human beings – intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, and moral in an integrated manner" (NEP, 2020), and this is an important consideration of the guidelines for implementation of CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK FOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES under Nagaland University.

#### 1. DEFINITIONS, ELIGIBILITY, AND DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME

#### **1.1 SEMESTER/CREDITS**

A semester comprises 90 working days and an academic year is divided into two semesters

- The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. A credit is a unit by which the coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum 15 weeks).
- Each course may have only a lecture component or a lecture and tutorial component or a lecture and practicum component or a lecture, tutorial, and practicum component, or only practicum component. For example, a three-credit lecture course in a semester means three one-hour lectures per week with each one-hour lecture counted as one credit. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a three-credit lecture course is equivalent to 45 hours of teaching.
- One credit for tutorial work means one hour of engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a one-credit tutorial in a course is equivalent to 15 hours of engagement.

- A one-credit course in practicum or lab work, community engagement and services, and fieldwork in a semester mean two-hour engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a one-credit practicum in a course is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement. A one-credit of Seminar or Internship or Studio activities or Field practice/projects or Community engagement and service means two-hour engagements per week. Accordingly, in a semester of 15 weeks duration, one credit in these courses is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.
- A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits. For example, a 4–credit course with three credits assigned for lectures and one credit for practicum shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 2-hour duration field-based learning/project or lab work, or workshop activities per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a 4-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 30 hours of practicum. Similarly, a 4 –credit course with 3- credits assigned for lectures and one credit for tutorial shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. In a semester of 15 weeks duration, a fourcredit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 15 hours of tutorials.
- The following types of courses/activities constitute the programmes of study. Each of them will require a specific number of hours of teaching/guidance and laboratory/ studio/workshop activities, field-based learning/projects, internships, and community engagement and service.

#### **1.2 MAJOR AND MINOR DISCIPLINES**

**MAJOR DISCIPLINE** is the discipline or subject of main focus and the degree will be awarded in that discipline. Students should secure the prescribed number of credits (about 50% of total credits) through core courses in the major discipline.

**MINOR DISCIPLINE** helps a student to gain a broader understanding beyond the major discipline. For example, if a student pursuing an Economics major obtains a minimum of 12 credits from a bunch of courses in Statistics, then the student will be awarded B.A. degree in Economics with a Minor in Statistics

#### Note: 50% of the total credits from minors may be secured in the relevant subject/ discipline and another 50% of the total credits can be earned from any discipline as per students' choice.

Students are advised to choose Minor discipline from other relevant subjects in such a way that the knowledge gained from the Minor papers enriches the study of the Core Major course of the student.

Note: A core course offered in a Major discipline/subject may be treated as an Minor core course by other discipline/subject and vice versa.

#### 1.3 AWARDING UG CERTIFICATE, UG DIPLOMA, AND DEGREES

**UG CERTIFICATE** Students who opt to exit after completion of the first year and have secured 40 credits will be awarded a UG certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the first year. These students are allowed to re-enter the degree programme within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years.

**UG DIPLOMA** Students who opt to exit after completion of the second year and have secured 80 credits will be awarded the UG diploma if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the second year. These students are allowed to re-enter within a period of three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years

**3-YEAR UG DEGREE** Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme will be awarded UG Degree in the Major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 120 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirement as given in Table 1.

**4-YEAR UG DEGREE (HONOURS)** A four-year UG Honours degree in the major discipline will be awarded to those who complete a fouryear degree programme with 160 credits and have satisfied the credit requirements as given in Table 1.

**4-YEAR UG DEGREE (HONOURS WITH RESEARCH)** Students who secure 75% marks and above in the first six semesters and wish to undertake research at the undergraduate level can choose a research stream in the fourth year. They should do a research project or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty member of the College. The research project/ dissertation will be in the major discipline. The students, who secure 160 credits, including 12 credits from a research project/dissertation, are awarded UG Degree (Honours with Research).

Note : Honours students not undertaking research project will do 3 theory courses for 12 credits in lieu of a research project / Dissertation

# (B) TWO YEARS POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM: M.A EDUCATION (CBCS UNDER NAGALAND UNIVERSITY)

#### (i) Course Structure

The two years M.A Programme, spread over four semesters, consists of 14 Core papers including two Elective/Optional papers. Each paper is worth 5 credits (100 Marks). Students may also opt to do Dissertation in lieu of two courses (MAEDU-312 and MAEDU-416), one each in semester III and semester IV. The Department will be offering two (2) open papers (MAEDU- 208 and MAEDU-413), one each in the 2nd and 4 th semesters. Students will be evaluated for 30% of credit value (30 Marks) through continuous assessment- Internal tests, seminars and assignments. The remaining 70% of credit value (70 Marks) will be evaluated on the basis of an end semester examination. Each student must attend a minimum of 75% of the classes conducted in each individual paper, failing which they will not be eligible to appear in the end semester examination. The pass mark for MA Education should be 45 %

# 6. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

#### (i). General Guidelines for Online Admission

- Registration and form fill up will be online through the college web portal (https// www.dimapurgovtcollege.in) and admission will be through entrance test
- Candidates with 45% of marks in HSSLC exam will be eligible to apply for B.A. and B.Com. Major course.
- Candidates having a gap of one year may also apply.
- Documents required for uploading: (i) Mark sheet of class X (ii) Mark sheet of class XII (iii) Admit Card of class X (iv). Certificate of ST/SC/OBC/ PWD (if any) (v) Passport size photograph, and (vi) Signature.

#### (ii) Entrance Test

• There will be separate Entrance test in different sessions for the following three category. For each category, it will comprise of a written examination and will be for a total of 150 marks of 2 hours duration. Out of the total allotted marks, 125 will be on the subject based on Class XII and 25 will be based on Mathematical/ Reasoning aptitude (class X based)

#### (a). BA Education/English/ History//Political Science/Philosophy/Psychology/ Sociology(Major) – Combined

The combined test will consists of all multiple choice questions (MCQ) only. \*The entrance test for the BA (Major)-combined will be in the morning session \*\*Applicants those who also want to apply for BA Economics (Major), they have to apply separately for the same, for which entrance test will be in the evening session along with B.Com entrance test.

#### (b). BA Economics (Major)

The test will consists of all multiple choice questions (MCQ) as well as descriptive.



#### (c). B. Com. (Major)

The test will consists of all multiple choice questions (MCQ) as well as descriptive.

- Selection of the students for admission will be through a Merit List based on the normalized score, i.e. total sum of (i). 50% weightage (best of five) of marks scored in HSSLC exam and (ii) 50% weightage of the marks scored in the entrance exam.
- For the selected candidates, allocation of the Major subject will be based on their normalized score, given preference and availability of seats.
- The selected students will report to the respective Head of the Department (HoD) for document verification and subsequent online admission fee payment.
- A 2nd list and 3rd list will be declared based on availability of seats.

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## 7. GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

Students of Dimapur Government College are expected to be polite and positive in their behaviour and attitude to one and all within and outside the college. The college desires that the students nurture a desire for academic excellence, a love for hard work, team spirit and exhibit exemplary discipline and good conduct at all times during their stay in the college.

- Duration for each class / period shall be uniformly fixed at one (1) hour
- Students must be regular in attending their classes and maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in all the subjects.
- The college authority does not accept any request for leave from the students. Requirements for leave has to be met from the 25 % relaxation in attendance as allowed.
- Any student found indulging in unfair means during examinations is liable for expulsion.
- Use of tobacco products, alcohol, banned drugs and narcotic substances is strictly prohibited. Anyone found in college under the influence of such substances is liable to severe penalty which may include expulsion.
- Students are not allowed to carry any weapons or harmful gadgets with them inside the college campus.
- No tribal student union or association shall be allowed to function without the prior approval of the college authority.
- As per the directive of the University Grants Commission, ragging is completely banned. Suitable action shall be initiated against defaulters.
- Students are to keep their classrooms clean. For any wilful damage to the college property, fines will be realised/recovered from the concerned student.
- Students are to carry their Identity Cards with them at all times. The Card must be renewed at the start of subsequent semesters.
- Students without proper uniform will not be permitted to attend classes.

- Students who wish to avail Transfer Certificate have to submit an application addressed to the Principal along with no-dues and clearance certificate issued by the Librarian. A 'No Objection' letter has to be procured from the University for transfer to another institution and for which an acceptance form has to be signed by the accepting College authority.

# 8. EXAMINATION AND ASSESSMENT

Students of Dimapur Government College are expected to be polite and positive in their behaviour and attitude to one and all within and outside the college. The college desires that the students nurture a desire for academic excellence, a love for hard work, team spirit and exhibit exemplary discipline and good conduct at all times during their stay in the college

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- Use of mobile phone inside the classrooms is strictly prohibited.

The examination process for all the six semesters shall consist of internal and external assessment. The internal assessment is done within the college and the external exams are conducted by the University. The duration of each semester will be a period of six (6) months. The semester break up shall be as follows:

a) Marks Weightage & Eligibility for Internal Assessment : Internal assessment is done for all the papers and carries 25 marks. The scheme of awarding marks in internal assessment shall be as follows

Components	Total Marks
Two Class Test	25 Marks for each test
Assignment Test + Seminar / Project Assessment Test.	10 + 15 Marks

- A student must score a minimum of 10 marks (out of 25 marks i.e., 40%) in each paper in the internal assessment.
- Average of best of the two assessment test will be considered for the final internal assessment.
- A student should have 75% attendance in each paper to be eligible to fill end semester exam form.
- b) External Assessment for Honours Paper :
- Honours paper shall have descriptive type questions only covering all five units.
- A student will have to answer five questions of 15 marks each (one from each unit). In each unit, there shall be internal choice from where the students shall have to answer at least one question. The total marks shall be 15x5 =75.

#### c) Passing Rules

- Minimum credits requirment to complete for B.A/ B.Com Honours is 140.
- For passing of each course, a candidate must secure a minimum of 40% marks (Equivalent Grade 'C') in end semester examination . For internal assessment, a candidate must secure a minimum of 40% marks as well. Grading shall be based on marks obtained in both components i.e. internal assessment and end semester examination.

- In any case, a student shall not be allowed to repeat/improve a course for internal assessment.
- The 1st semester student who has not been promoted to the 2nd semester, due to any reason, may quit the programme or may seek for a fresh admission in the same subject or other after passing the existing admission procedure.
- A candidate shall not be permitted to proceed from the first semester up to final semester if he/she fails in more than 2 (two) core papers in any of the semester examination.
- If student does not appear in the examination of all the prescribed courses of a semester, he/she shall not be promoted to the next semester. Such students may quit the programme or can take admission in the same semester provided that the total period will not exceed 10 consecutive semesters (5 years). However, such students will not be considered for merit, rankings, etc.
- Candidate are allowed to repeat their failed papers as many attempts as possible within the total time frame (10 semester) to clear their back papers.

#### d) Grade Improvement :

- A candidate who has passed B.A. or B.Com degree examination, maybe permitted to re-appear in examination for grade improvement only in theory course (s)passed with Grades lower than A+.
- A candidate is allowed to give improvement for a maximum of (One) paper/course only
- If a candidate secures lesser marks in the improvement examinations, the original marks shall be retained.
- A candidate is eligible for improvement only after passing the final semester (i.e., 6th Semester). However, a candidate is not allowed to take improvement beyond 10 (ten) semesters, counting from the enrollment.
- A candidate desiring to apply for improvement shall apply through the concerned college /Examination Centre on payment of requisite fee and the college shall forward to the examination section of the University along with the list of repeaters.
- A candidate who applies for improvement shall surrender Original Marksheet already issued to him/her.
- A candidate appearing for improvement shall not be entitled to get any Prize/Rank/ Medal/Scholarship award.

# 9. LEARNING RESOURCES

#### (i) Library

The college library has a sizeable collection of general and reference books. The library is automated and all the books are barcoded. The institution also subscribes to select periodicals, magazines and a few multi- disciplinary journals and e-resources like NLIST. The library has a collection of rare books and documents as well as a collection of theses and research done by the faculty members. At present, the library has around 9590 books and 15 print journals. The library remains open on all working days between 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Library membership is open to all the students enrolled, faculty and non-teaching staff of the college.

- Internet facility is provided in the library and students can access the facility for availing e-resources and other web based information.
- Photostat facility is also available in the library. These can be availed on payment as it is a pay and use facilitity.
- The library is under CCTV surveillance.
- (ii) Indira Gandhi National Open University: The University is an apex institution of Higher Education in the Country. It offers various Post Graduate, Under Graduate, Diploma and Certificate programmes under Open & Distance Learning (ODL) mode. An IGNOU study centre functions in the college since 1993. The programme fees are nominal and the college encourages the students to pursue Certificate & Diploma programmes that would further enrich their academic qualifications in addition to the regular programmes pursued.
- (iii) **Computer Lab :** The Computer Lab in the college was opened in 2012 to offer proficiency programmes in Information Technology. Interested students can approach the centre incharge for enrolling in Basic Programmes that are offered at subsidised rates.
- (iv) **Psychology Lab:** Psychology lab was established in 2017 to enable students to familiarize and use standardized tests and equipments. It is also to help the students to understand mind body relationship by providing them access to psychological assessment and techniques
- (v) Smart Room : A multipurpose room equipped with the required teaching and audio visual aids is available for the benefit of all concerned. Seminars, workshops, lecture sessions are hosted in the room.
- (vi) ICT : enabled classrooms are provided for both Arts and Commerce classes.
- (vii) Wi-Fi Facility in the Campus : The facility supports access to e-resources and net facility in the campus. Students and staff can register themselves and avail Wi-Fi facility.

# 10. GENERAL FACILITIES

**a)** Hostel : The college offers in-campus hostel facility with a 100-bedded Boys Hostel and a 74-bedded Girls Hostel. Only students who have been selected for admission to the college can apply for hostel seats. Admissions to the hostels are based on certain criteria formulated by the college administration and the committee in-charge. Forms are available in the college website.

**b) Canteen :** For the benefit of the students and staff, hygienic refreshment facilities are provided in the canteen at affordable rates. The canteen is open on all working days. Consumption of any intoxicants is strictly prohibited in the canteen.

**c) MI Room:** The college has a medical inspection room with adequate facilities to attend to medical emergencies.

**d) Pad-Vending Machine:** To further encourage a women-friendly environment in the campus, the college has installed a sanitary pad vending machine in a separate washroom.

e) **Drinking Water :** Safe drinking water is available in the campus. Students may kindly note that the water coolers and water ATM may be handled with care.

**f) Students Grievances Redressal Cell :** Students Grievances redressal boxes are placed in the corridor. Students may drop their suggestions/ideas/grievances in the box with names and roll numbers. Students' confidentiality will be maintained. Also students can lodge grievances online through college website www.dimapurgovtcollege.in

**g) Power Backup :** The college provides 24 hours power back-up facility. However, students may kindly ensure that light switches are turned off when not required, to conserve energy.

**h)** Auditorium : Students have access to both indoor and outdoor sports facilities for their recreation and sports related events. For any query, students may contact the Sports Committee.

i) Hand Sanitizer : Touch-free hand sanitizer dispensers have also been installed at several points in the campus.

j) Surveillance : The College is under CCTV surveillance.

# 14. CO-CURRICULAR & EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Students are required to opt for one co-curricular activity at the time of admission a) **Co-Curricular Activities** 

**i.** Vocational and Life Skill Training : Various co-curricular activities are organised for the benefit of the students throughout the year. The college has a Skill Hub under National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), In the Country, the skill hub are created through Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojna (PMKVY 4.0). There are four approved job roles, namely

(i) Sewing Machine Operator,	NSQF Level 3; Contact hours 300
(ii) Technician (Home Appliances);	NSQF Level 3; Contact hours 210
(iii) Technician (Computer Hardware).	NSQF Level 3; Contact hours 210
(iv) Beautician:	NSQF Level 3; Contact hours 210

After successful completion of the training, trainees receive a globally recognised certificate by NSDC. A vocational programme in Floriculture is also being offered with the initiative of DGC RUSA. These training program included both Theory and Practical papers to enhance the skills of the learner.

ii. National Cadet Corps: The NCC unit in the college activated in 1989, includes both Boys & Girls wings. Students can volunteer for membership. The college encourages its NCC membersto take part in various National and State level camps. The NCC wing is looked after by Teachers designated as Associate NCC Officer (ANO) or Caretaker

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Officer (CTO). NCC students are encouraged to appear for NCC 'B' and 'C' certificate so as to find employment opportunities in the Armed forces and various Law Enforcement Agencies.

**iii.** National Service Scheme & Red Ribbon Club: The college has an NSS unit for students to participate in various voluntary social service and community building activities. From time to time, various on/off campus programmes are organised. The Red Ribbon Club functions in line with the national mandate of creating awareness among student community on issues such as blood donations, HIV/AIDS, general sensitivity to be exhibited towards people living with HIV, among others. The Club organises in-campus blood donation camps and maintains a database of donors who can be approached in times of emergencies. The NSS unit in the college functions under the supervision of faculty members designated as programme officers.

**iv. Eco and Beautification Club:** This club, set up in 2013, provides scope for Eco lovers to undertake Eco-related programmes in the college campus and the neighbourhood. The objective is to involve students and teachers towards creating an aesthetic and eco-friendly campus. Every year 5 June (World Environment Day) is observed as the official Green Day for this club.

**v.** Literari Club: Initiated by the department of English, the club came into being in 2011. It provides a platform for students to be groomed in creativity and to display their literary skills. Each year, on the 11 of November, to commemorate the National Literary Day, the club organises the Annual Literary Day of DGC. Competitions in creative writing, quiz, extempore, debates, declamation, etc. are organised for students on this day. The Literati Club includes all members of the department of English, the Literary Secretary and any student who enrols in the Honours programme in English. However, membership is also open to all students.

vi. Performing and Fine Arts Club: The club organises drama, painting, photography and Fine Arts competitions and Music classes at subsidised fees. Students who wish to enrol in the club can contact the Convenor.

**vii) Departmental Students' Club** : Each academic department has a Students Club with office bearers and teacher advisors. These clubs provide a platform to bring out the creative best from an individual student through students centric activities. Students organise discipline specific seminars, debates, quiz and celebrate special days relevant to the subject discipline. These clubs further promote student-teacher interaction beyond the classroom teaching and learning approach, which is primarily teacher centric.

#### b) Extra-Curricular Activities

i. Evangelical Union Fellowship : The EU is an inter denominational congregation. The college through EU fellowship supports students to engage in spiritual and moral

growth. EU membership is open to all and it meets twice a week (Tuesdays & Fridays). The EU conducts fellowships, prayer meets, retreats, camps etc.

**ii.** College Magazine : The college publishes an annual magazine, 'Pursuit', for each academic session. Teachers and students are encouraged to publish their articles and literary works in the magazine for the benefit of various sections of readers.

**iii.** Wall Magazine : The college encourages creativity among students through the wall magazine. Students can display their literary skill, paintings, collage etc., in the wall magazine.

**iv. Games and Sports :** The college Sports Week is organised annually. Various games, track and field events are hosted. Students are encouraged to participate in the various sporting events based on their natural talents. Friendly matches, tournaments with other teams are also encouraged.
